## *A Message from the Acting Dean*

### GIFTS OF THE SPIRIT

With Pentecost at hand, it put me in mind to think about the Holy Spirit and how it operates among us. It is hard for us to imagine what that scene long ago must have been like in that place where the disciples were gathered. A sound like thunder, then something like flames dancing on their heads, speaking in languages they had never spoken, yet understood by those who spoke the language. The Holy Spirit had dramatically made itself known.

The Pentecostal churches still claim such charismatic gifts of the Spirit. There is even a strain of Episcopal churches that worship in such fashion, where speaking in tongues is common, for instance. They say that just because the day of Pentecost happened so long ago, does not mean that the gifts of the Spirit are no longer present. These nine charismatic gifts are listed in 1 Corinthians 12:1-14: Wisdom, Knowledge, Discerning of Spirits (human, angelic, demonic), Speaking in Tongues, Interpretation of Tongues, Prophecy, Faith, Working of Miracles, and Healing.

Most of us have not had such a dramatic and direct experience of the Holy Spirit. There have been times when I wish I had. Often, I believe, there is a such a strong desire for the authentication of our faith, that at times when we are particularly open, God provides us with the experience of the Spirit's presence. I have felt the presence of the Spirit, though not in such charismatic ways. I know wonderful Christians who speak in tongues, or seem to have the gift of healing, or other gifts. I believe their experiences should be honored.

At the same time, most of us sense the Holy Spirit working in more subtle ways. For us there is another list of spiritual gifts, from Romans 12:6-8: Prophecy, Ministry, Teaching, Exhortation, Giving, Leading, and Showing Mercy. These gifts seem more attainable to us, and perhaps more practical for the building up of the Church and the community. These gifts are not for our own profit, but for the whole community. Prophecy is not about foretelling the future, but to warn us when we are drifting away from God's plan. Ministry is not just for the ordained, but for all who have a chosen a way of expressing care for others. We all know about teaching in formation programs, but how about teaching those who do not know Christ about him. Exhortation is the gift of encouraging and motivating those who would step out into ministry and those who have become discouraged. We are all called to give and to tithe, but those of us who have been blessed with greater resources might cheerfully give even more. Leading means seeing a need that may be bigger than what we can do alone, and working with others to get it accomplished. Showing mercy is about discerning who needs help, and caring for them in the way that they need.

Surely you recognize one, or more, of these gifts that may be yours. Paul tells us that none of us have all the gifts, but we all have at least one, and we have all the gifts we need among ourselves. If you are not sure what your gift of the Spirit is, please come talk with me.

As we enter the long "green" season of ordinary time after Pentecost, our attention may be drawn away from the intense times of Lent and Easter. The work of the church continues, and your gifts are needed.

### THANK YOU, THANK YOU, LYNN

Lynn Gilbert is not going to loll about watching the soaps and eating bonbons as she begins her retirement as the Cathedral's Administrator.

She recently returned from a "mini family reunion" in Jupiter, Florida, to where she is not tempted to relocate. "That humidity is too much," she said. But the First Communion of a granddaughter is a powerful lure.

Lynn is about to celebrate both her retirement and her 70<sup>th</sup> birthday with a full-scale reunion with as many of her three sons, daughters-in-law, and seven grandkids - four girls and three boys - as can be gathered in one place. They live

in Colorado, Florida, and Wauwatosa. "I'm thinking Door County," she said. "But the kids want to do something big." Stay tuned.

She's joined the Silver Sneakers program at the YMCA nearest her Elm Grove home. "I have no excuse now," not the *I'm tired - I have too much to do* of her working days.

And she's looking for a particular type of painting class, for the Fall. Her specialty is bare wood boxes, small jewelry boxes, and mini chests of drawers, from sanding and priming to final decorative painting. "I did some at Cardinal Stritch in the 70s, and I loved it." Keep an eye peeled at your local craft fair?

For seventeen years Lynn worked in property management, where she was in charge of five properties, primarily new constructions and start-ups, from breaking ground to opening rentals. She loved that job, and it taught her many of the skills that she brought to the Cathedral. Lynn went on to work at The Relocation Center and earned her real estate license, but she soon discovered the job was boring and not a fit. "I didn't like being in a cubicle. And it was not at all creative." She learned of All Saints' through Cathedral parishioner, Julie Willis, then a co-worker. She met Dean George Hillman at Julie and Greg's wedding, just before Carol Edwards retired as the Cathedral's secretary. In June of 2001 she applied for the newly created position of Cathedral Administrator and was hired.

And four months later came 9/11. It was a period of high stress, even here on the "middle coast." "It seemed to affect everyone in the country. We all remember where we were when we heard the news, just like the death of JFK."

Lynn had no church work experience, nor, for that matter, Episcopalian context; she's a Roman Catholic. But, she said, it's about "focusing on the people, not the religion. For some - on the phone, coming in - I was the first contact." Dean Hillman trained her and, she says, "I got real involved, real fast." After Dean Hillman's tenure there came Fr. Himmerich - "twice" - Dean Raasch, Fr. Tom Winslow, and now Fr. Drebert.

Volunteers have been essential. "The Holy Folders: Glen, Sandy, Fr. Cole, now Mary Marshall. Walter has been my right hand and my right brain. And Marshall: We never had a fight, because I'm a saint," she chuckled. "Sometimes it gets real quiet for awhile." Fred Weinman is much missed, but "Jonathan Formhals has stepped in," with woodworking, his interest in the memorials through the building. "Our sexton, John: He never says no."

"And then there's Joe Kucharski." Another chuckle. "He's really a wonderful friend, who made my years at the Cathedral extra special."

“And Barb Klauber at the Diocesan office; she’s been wonderful to work with.”

The secret, Lynn says, is “a matter of mutual respect for each other’s jobs.”

Not that things haven’t been “a bit crazy” at times. Lynn even became one of the official bat catchers. The flying rodents were frequent visitors for a time. “Once when I was alone in the building, with no one else there, I was determined to evict one of the critters. Finally, it was so exhausted, I caught it with a box.”

Plumbing, especially in the upstairs restroom, has been known to be problematic. “The toilet was overflowing into the library!”

Strangers appearing at the door, appealing for help, can present a sad, frustrating problem. “We can’t usually help, though we feel we, a church, should be able to. Sometimes we raided the fridge.” Some people became belligerent, a little frightening. There was one woman who came often, with kids. Occasionally Lynn would give people money from her own purse. “I gave this woman money once. She promised to repay me, and eventually she did. I found a Pick ‘n’ Save gift card in an envelope addressed to me. Surprise, surprise! The balance on the card turned out to be 65 cents! Surprise, surprise. She tried, though.”

“There is a sense of love at the Cathedral among all the people, all walks of life and life styles. I felt embraced. Roman Catholic parishes tend to be large,” Lynn said. “This is small and intimate.”

Lynn was with us for nine years. “The last five, we’ve been in transition. It took its toll. “Now,” she says, “I have an open window to family, friends, the world! I leave with a lot of love for all of the Saints. This was the best way to close my career years. I’m so relaxed and at peace!”

Thank you, Lynn, for your wonderful, creative, and dedicated service.

### **SUMMERTIME MEANS THE GREAT HUNGER BOOK SALE**

**August 5 to 10**

Here it is, summer, and that means **Book Sale**. We have been collecting over the winter and will begin pricing and sorting on June 14<sup>th</sup>. Although the actual sale doesn’t start until August 5<sup>th</sup>, all the books have to be sorted and priced before then. On May 9<sup>th</sup> we prepared postcards at coffee hour (see the accompanying picture). Now we need volunteers to price, sort and pack the books. We work Monday through Thursday, 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Pricers can be trained on the job, and really doesn’t require much more skill than reading a chart. People can come only once or regularly, for 1 hour or all 4. Young people are hired to do the heavy lifting, so the job is not too strenuous, and the company is always interesting! If you can help out, please talk to one of the committee chairs for more particulars – or just show up.

Our Book Sale has become the largest used book sale in the area. Besides books, we sell previously owned CDs, books on tape, DVDs and videos. In the course of the sale we sell thousands of used books and have been reaching sales of over \$20,000 for the past several years. All the net proceeds are donated to local and world hunger causes. In this manner we can support the work done in our own community through the Interchange and the Gathering, and many other groups such as St. Benedict the Moor’s Meal program, Hunger Task Force, and Food for Families. Money is also donated to world causes through the Episcopal Relief and Development Fund and others as needed.

Even if you can’t help during the day, you can help by collecting your books at home or work and bringing them

with you to church. If you have a bunch, we can pick them up; just call church (414-271-7719) and leave a message for Marshall Pepper. Mention the sale to friends, relatives and co-workers. Most people have books they have read but can't bring themselves to throw away. We sell every type of book: fiction, non-fiction, children's books, reference books, and even some in foreign languages. Sorry, but old textbooks (prior to 2005 is considered old!), encyclopedias from previous decades or Readers' Digest Condensed don't sell, so please don't bring them. But don't forget those CDs/DVDs that keep piling up; they sell like hotcakes.

Other ways you can help with the sale:

- Collect paper boxes from work or office for the sale. Copy paper boxes with covers work the best for packing books. If you could arrange for a weekly collection then you could bring them to church on Sunday. Flats are also needed for the sale itself.
- Take flyers and post them where you work, shop, or live.
- Start a collection box at work.
- Put an article about our sale in any newsletters you receive through work, organizations, or neighborhood groups. We can help with the information if you want.
- Volunteer to do book pick-ups on your side of town.
- Mention the sale whenever you can. Wear your Book Sale shirt to as many events as you can stand or use your Book Sale bag. We can use the free advertising. (See a committee member named below to acquire a shirt and/or bag).
- If you know anybody who works for the *Milwaukee Journal Sentinel* or any local radio or TV station, please tell one of the committee chairs.

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### **THIRD QUARTER OUTREACH PROJECT** **Revisiting Old Friends – Our Space**

The Cathedral's third quarter outreach project, which may include a bit of hands-on labor, is OUR SPACE, an organization for those with any diagnosis of mental illness. It began at All Saints' Cathedral, under the sponsorship of Deacon Antoine Linterieur as a daytime drop-in center. Its

mission is "to empower adults who have experienced mental illness to attain a more meaningful life by offering quality programs and services which promote recovery and renewal."

Their current location at 525 W. Lincoln has been outgrown, and they are in process of purchasing Oakton Manor, a former Community Based Residential Facility on 15<sup>th</sup> and National. This large house will be rehabbed and enlarged to provide space for a community room, meeting and program rooms, a demonstration apartment, and office space.

In addition, 35 supportive apartments will be built to the rear of the property, for which Our Space will offer supportive services promoting recovery and independence for program members.

Our Space expects to move into this building some time in late summer. For that, many willing hands and strong backs will be much needed and appreciated! Watch for opportunities to volunteer.

For the last six years I have been photographing people with their cows. When I first viewed these images I was struck by how many of them were about people watching and waiting. Focus for all participants, cows and people, pointed in the same direction, concentrating on and reacting to events playing out around them. In this series of portraits, unlike earlier images, the detail is sometimes more subtle and the subjects appear reflective, relaxed and unaware of the plodding perpetual motion surrounding them.”

Gary's photos will be exhibited from June 2<sup>nd</sup> through August 29<sup>th</sup> at the Museum of Wisconsin Art's show, “To See Ourselves as Others See Us – Contemporary Wisconsin Portraits.” The museum is located at 300 S. 6<sup>th</sup> Ave., West Bend, WI 53095.

Fr Winslow is the Senior Division Chaplain for the FBI-Milwaukee. He has also served as Chaplain for the

Wisconsin Chapter of the FBI National Academy Associates and the Wisconsin Chiefs of Police Association. Prior to becoming a chaplain, Fr Winslow served twenty years as a police officer for the State of Wisconsin, 15 of those as the Chief of Police at Wisconsin State Fair Park. He is an honor graduate of the Milwaukee Police Academy, the FBI National Academy, and the U.S. Secret Service Dignitary Protection Seminar. In 2001 he was awarded an ICPC Honor Bar for his service at Ground Zero in New York City.

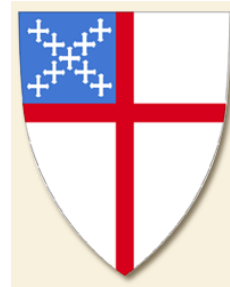
My hobbies include cooking, gardening, and photography.

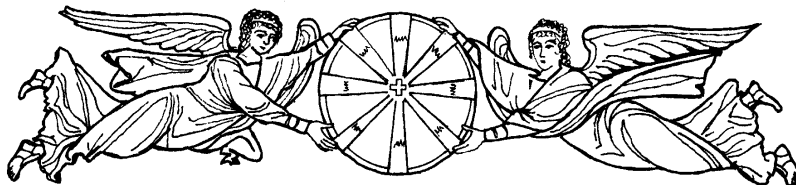
